REMARKS:

The shelter is currently in good condition. The town of Cohocton is in the process of constructing an outdoor exercise area for the dogs. That will allow the dogs be outside while their runs are cleaned.

However, the entrance into the shelter is still obstructed by the large mounds of dirt/salt that is stored at the highway department. The area in front of the doorway to the shelter is still littered with broken pieces of blacktop and stone. This could prove hazardous to anyone entering the shelter. The indoor kennels have rusted hinges with wood dividers. It is recommended that these be replaced before they become unsafe or structurally unsound. It is anticipated that these issues will be resolved by the time of the next inspection in six months. It is highly recommended that the entryway into the shelter be corrected as soon as possible and before the cold winter sets in since this is a safety issue,

Both of these observations were also noted in the last inspection report done six months ago.
