Practical Tips

- **Read the RFP closely, address every aspect, and follow the guidelines.**
- **Understand what is most important to the granting agency.**
- **Reviewers may not have your level of expertise in the subject. Write accordingly.**
- **Address high priority issues and develop a compelling case.**

Common Proposal Criticisms

- **Insufficient justification**
 - Not addressing a high priority need
 - Already been done / being done
- **Another project already funded**
- **Unlikely to have an impact**
- **Vague, unfocused, confusing**
- **Lack of capacity to conduct project**
- **Question completion within timeframe**
- **Poor budget justification**

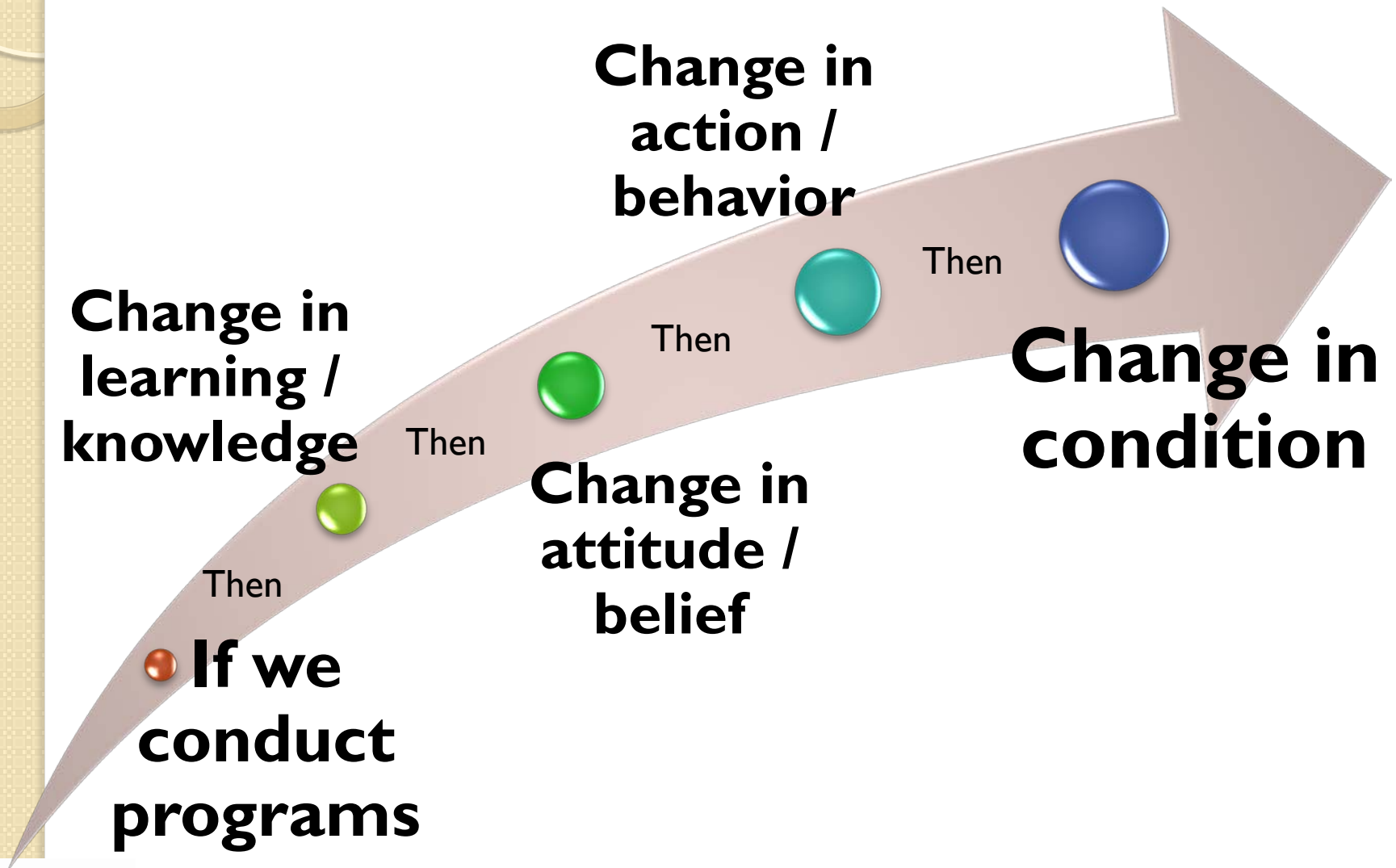
